

Summer Reading 2025

Grades K-2



Summer is a great time to support your child's reading progress! Students who don't read much over the summer show a decline in reading performance from the end of one year to the start of the next. Reading over the summer can help your child maintain the reading gains they have made. In order to prevent the loss of reading skills, below is the recommended summer reading by grade level.

- Step 1: Select one of the books listed below for your child's grade level for the 2025-2026 school year.
- Step 2: Select one activity for your book; at least one activity must be completed.
- Step 3. Bring your completed activity to school by Friday, August 22 for an <u>extra</u> <u>credit</u> grade.



Step 4. i-Ready Summer Challenge will be available from June 10th · July 26th. Prizes will be awarded to the students who have successfully completed the "At Home" summer lessons with a total of 10 reading and 10 math lessons.
